YouthBank 2014-2015

YouthBank is a project managed by young volunteers from across the North East area of Glasgow that gives out grants of up to £250 for individuals and up to £500 for groups. Each YouthBank grant must be an idea lead by young people for young people and it must also benefit their wider community.

During the year 2014-2015 YouthBank received a total of 118 applications for grants throughout the North East of Glasgow.

There was a total of 106 successful applications; 32 from the Inner-East area, 43 from the East area and 31 from the North.

Our grant pot covers a wide range of projects, from reward trips to lifeguard qualifications or from 3D printers to new football strips.

The full £35,000 grant pot was spent on these 106 successful applications and through that over 3,000 young people in the North East of Glasgow have directly benefitted from the projects and ideas that have been funded. On top of that around 200 young people are supported and develop skills through our application and interview process.

YouthBank funds many amazing projects that young people gain many skills and qualifications from; this report includes a small collection of successfully funded and delivered grants.

K30 Tollcross Athletic FC (YMCA)

Project: Friday Night League

Awarded: £500.00

The young people at the Tollcross YMCA had 5 a side football games as part of their summer programme and through that they developed Tollcross Athletic FC and decided to train and enter a league. They had sourced funding for training and transport when the club first started but that was running low and they also needed funding for football strips, which they imprinted to YoMo logo on.

K69 Glasgow Kelvin College – Youth Access

Project: Less Rave, More Rock

Awarded: £233.99

A group of young people had the idea for a music event, with bands and singers performing on the night but also competitions for others to get involved in, such as, guitar hero and air guitar. The young people who are involved in the planning the event are using it to achieve dynamic youths and youth achievement awards.

K64 Connect Community Trust (Individual)


Project: ICS Tanzania

Awarded: £125.00

Pauline Wilson went on a 12 week programme, spending 10 of the 12 weeks in Tanzania in 3 different community schools educating youths about sexual health and life skills. As well as helping others the programme also focuses on personal development, such as team work and cultural work.

Project: Guitar Workshop

Awarded: £255.92

Young people in the Bridge youth club in Easterhouse had an interest in learning how to play guitar, they did not have enough guitars to conduct a lesson. The young people wanted to buy 4 more guitars and accessories to increase their members and meet the desires of the young people who attend.

Awarded: £320.00

This day out helped them develop a trusting relationship and friendship and they then came across very comfortable with one another when teaching others about sectarian issues.

K61 St Andrews RC Secondary School


Project: Technical Enterprise (3D Printer)

Awarded: £499.99

The pupils at St Andrew's Secondary Technical Enterprise group wanted a 3D printer to improve the work they do. Activities include setting up equipment, designing formats and producing and completing 3D structures. There was also a similar application for a 3D printer to YouthBank from the local youth club to St Andrew's so a condition of their grant was to allow young people from the youth club access to the 3D printer.

Project: Art Room Renovations

Awarded: £365.40

Also to celebrate the Commonwealth Games in Glasgow the group wanted to design a mural of the Commonwealth Logo for the wall and once the room and mural were finished they planned a gallery day to display the art work the group has completed.

Project: Scottish Parliament Visit


Awarded: £250.00

K97 Outward Bound

Project: Cookery Project

Awarded: £370

Outward bound wanted to run a 4 week cookery project in Whitehill Secondary School for 15 young people from 3 surrounding primary schools. Learning how to cook different healthy snacks and meals and in the final week the parents were invited along and the young people cooked 3 dishes for their parents and received a certificate for taking part in the project. The money from YouthBank helped buy the products for the dishes and helped make the project the success it was.

Project: S1 Halloween Disco

Awarded: £250.00

A group of S3 pupils came up with the idea to host a Halloween party for the new S1's to make them feel welcome at the school. They wanted to make the high school environment welcoming and provide an event for them to mingle and make new friends. YouthBank funding went towards a DJ, decorations and food and drink.

K66 Glasgow Life

Project: NPLQ Course

Awarded: £200.00 (Individual)

A young boy wanted to gain his National Pool Lifeguard Qualification but could not afford it himself. He wanted to keep people in the community safe when swimming and the qualification would allow him to gain first aid training also. This is something he had wanted for a long period of time and worked hard towards gaining it. YouthBank partly funded the cost of the qualification and the rest he was able to come up with himself and is now a fully qualified lifeguard.

K13 Playbusters

Project: Tricking

Awarded: £500

Tricking is a physical activity which involves gymnastics, martial arts and parkour and over 20 young people from Playbusters attended a 10 week programme to learn how to pull off these skills. This inspired many to get fit and healthy but also continue with the sport after the programme had finished.
